Moving on Track as Everyone Pulling Their Weight

The seminary is on the move. Since 2017, I have been telling our faculty, co-workers, and



students that the seminary entered a torch passing phase on different occasions like academic board meetings, all staff meetings, and chapel services. As many of our faculty and staff members are approaching retirement age, we are undergoing a transition period. In fact, not only our seminary staff but also the pastoral leadership in Hong Kong churches in general is undergoing a transition. In large and small churches alike, we are witnessing an older generation of pastors retiring from their ministry positions, making way for younger pastors.

While in this process of torch passing, I also often talk about what I wish for our seminary and the church; namely, I am anticipating that the Hong Kong Baptist Theological Seminary (HKBTS) would be doing even better researches and more down-

to-earth theology studies so that the church would be blessed even more. This has always been the goal of our seminary. I always stress that "teachers are the engine that drives the seminary forward" as it is my belief that *teachers*' spirituality, character, teaching, knowledge, and practice can really get the whole seminary going so that the seminary may help the church to respond to society and the world. Teachers in our seminary work diligently day after day on teaching, research, writing, cultivating students' spirituality, and being the life mentors of students. Together they drive the seminary to excellence. Teachers work exceedingly hard, so do I and the students.

For facilitating an environment where our teachers and students can focus on their work and strive for the goal of our seminary, the contribution of our *janitorial and office staff* who work quietly out of the limelight is indispensable. They are faithful stewards of this cradle of preachers, taking care of every single inch of the seminary. They lovingly tend all the plants, keeping the seminary clean and tidy with the most sedulous care. In order to carry on the support operations of the seminary with the least possible resource, they show great flexibility and dedication. Co-workers from different departments work together as one to take good care of the seminary so that our students may concentrate on learning and teachers on teaching.

In addition to teachers, students, and co-workers who spend a lot of time on the campus, the continuous growth of the seminary also depends heavily on *directors and members* of the *President's Council* who love HKBTS dearly. With talents given by God, they look out for the seminary and actively contribute to its development. Their life experience and valuable advice have helped me a great deal in my role as leader of the seminary.

After eight to nine years of prayer and hard work with everyone pulling their weight, the "Ten years' Project" I proposed when I first took office as president and the "Faith, Hope, and Love Project" I put forward in the Thanksgiving Service celebrating the 60th anniversary of our seminary are gradually taking shape. Over the years, our teaching staff, students, publication, graduate studies programs, lay believers equipping programs, and distance education program have all witnessed significant progress in terms of quality and quantity.

Seeing Grace in the Campus Extension Project

After all these years of re-organizing and strengthening, the "software" of our seminary is mostly on track, yet we still need to work on the "hardware" at this stage so that the seminary may walk further for the Lord. The older parts in the "hardware"

need renovation. To alleviate the long-lasting problem of space shortage, we also need more usable space, especially study and discussion spaces for graduate students, more space for the library collection, and more offices for teachers. Additional floor area would be required for the seminary to further realize its ministry.

Early 2016 marked a new milestone for the expansion project. The Board of Director set up the Campus Development Committee and the Building Committee respectively, kicking off the Extension Project of the Sai O Campus (Phase 3). The Campus Development Committee consists of those directors appointed by the Board of Directors. As every director is subject to retirement by rotation once every three years, the composition of the current committee is somewhat different from the original one. Current director members of the committee include Deacon Cecil Chan (Chairman), Deacon Ho Kin-chung, Deacon Lau Man-hin, Rev. Chan Chi-keung, and Rev. Chu Wood-ping. Moreover, Campus Development Committee then nominated those committed and gifted church members who are also highly experienced in architectural engineering to serve as a Building Committee in order to assist our administrative staff in matters such as lease modifications, tendering, and construction supervision. Members of the committee are as follows: Deacon Cecil Chan (Chairman), Dr. Joseph Kwan, Deacon Samuel Chan, Deacon John Pak, Deacon Thomas Tsang and Mr. Sam Chan. I was also appointed into the two committees in my capacity as the president of the seminary.

We have experienced the amazing guidance of God even in the early stage of the expansion project. When the seminary applied for the construction of an additional 8,000 square feet of floor area on the Sai O campus, the Lands Department assessed the land premium payable as HK\$37.97 million. All our committee members considered the amount much higher than the market value of the additional floor area, so we made a unanimous decision to appeal to the Lands Department for a reassessment. After loads of scrupulous preparation work,

the seminary submitted sufficient documents and provided strong justifications, which resulted in a massive cut in the land premium to \$16.57 million. In the end, we accepted a third offer of HK\$15.91 million.

With this amazing experience, we could again firmly proclaim that *God* is the only Lord of HKBTS. The whole expansion project must be led by the Lord while we closely follow Him to do His will.

Serving in Unity and Fellowship

The next task was to design floor plans for the new academic building, for which we elicited the professional advices of the Building Committee members again. The pleasant atmosphere in the meetings made it an enjoyable experience to exchange ideas. We wasted no time and energy on picking quarrels. Everyone gave all they have for the benefit of the seminary and the future of theological education. It is amazing that in our hard work we experienced fellowship as one. We appreciated and complemented one another while discerning God's will together.

On the grounds that teachers and co-workers are the actual users of the new building, the Building Committee suggested we should seek teachers' opinion on the design and planning of the building. It started with three teachers with architectural background (Dr. Freeman Huen, Dr. Nathan Ng, and Dr. Tony Sher) drafting a space allocation plan; and we went on to invite all teachers and department heads to voice their views. Meanwhile we also collected opinion from students. We extended the consultation to different users in order to make sure everyone had a chance to be heard, thus encouraging the involvement and participation of all stakeholders in the expansion project.

In the process of opinion collection, there were voices urging for environmental protection. Considering the importance of nature conservation from the perspective of faith practice, another working group, the *Campus Environmental Consultation and Development Committee*, was established under the Campus Development Committee in June 2018 in order to look into matters concerning energy efficiency, waste reduction, recycling, and campus greening at the seminary. While I am an ex officio member, a number of environmental protection experts among the Baptists are also invited to join the committee. They include Deacon Ho Kin-chung (Chairman), Deacon Cecil Chan, Mr. Steve Wong, Mr. Andy Ho, and Mr. Edward Lam.

The Sai O Campus was confronted with another severe external challenge in early August. One of the issues that concerned us is the government's plan to build a large sewage pumping station just 15 meters from our campus. We summoned the Campus Environmental Consultation and Development Committee and the Building Committee for a joint meeting, in which the committee members unanimously agreed that the construction of the sewage pumping station would not only cause irreversible damage to the surrounding eco-system and environment but also pose a health threat to our seminary's community and all visitors.

As committee members have their day jobs, and administrative staff members of the seminary were busy preparing for the new school term, we scheduled to meet at 7:30 in the morning so that everybody may go to work afterward. Since then we have always scheduled our meetings at 7:30 am. Though the issue we have to deal with is no easy matter, the meetings are always held in a pleasing atmosphere. One of the committee members once told me, "The meeting at 7:30 in the morning is indeed also a prayer gathering." What he meant is that we discuss God's work with a prayerful heart.

Chu Hoi-kwan, Peggy (B.Th.)



I'm grateful for my senior schoolmates who walked with me and reminded me to plan my timetable ahead of time, allocate time that I could use after class every day, and schedule rest time and stress relief activities so as not to become overstressed.

One of the most important things I take away from these four years is my time management skills. Knowing that I need a lot of rest, I tried my best to plan my timetable in a way that I could go to bed before midnight, making sure that I could stay alert in classes the next day. No matter how busy I was with my course work, I would spare time to go jogging and dancing with my classmates. In this way, in the four years of seminary life I have acquired the habit of keeping early hours, planning ahead, and finishing my work early. I owe this to every teacher, senior schoolmate, and fellow classmate who has walked with me and given me reminders and encouragement.

Getting Along in a Community

Speaking of companions, HKBTS is really a big family, a disciple community in which everyone is willing to offer hospitality to one another. God wants me to get along with different people in this family in order to enhance my life.

My fellow classmates are my biggest treasure! We have come from different upbringings as well as different denominations, and have different theological thinking, not to mention that we have completely different personalities: there are the hot-tempered and the gentle, the daring and the timid. At first we had a lot of conflicts (when I was scared and even considering quitting), yet as time goes by we all learned to accept one another and put ourselves in one another's shoes. We became willing to put aside our own stubbornness and feelings for the sake of the relationship. After four years, we have more understanding and love for one

another.

I learned that it takes many sacrifices and a lot of tolerance for any relationship to work; to be of one mind, we constantly have to accept our differences and learn to appreciate one another instead of trying to simply transform others. God did not create anyone perfect, so we have to love others with the love of God, having faith that God will always keep us in His love.

Graduation marks the beginning of our new journey. I am deeply grateful for these four years during which I could contemplate God and learn more about Him, throw myself into the exploration of the world of the Bible and transform my life. There is still a long way to go. I hope I can strive to live for my Lord and become His faithful servant.

The requirement of the program I studied, however, was not easy. I had to face and solve quite a number of problems. Due to my personal limitations, and considering the needs of the family and balance in ministry, I often found my time, energy and ability wanting. Heavy loads of homework made me tired and depressed, and I also experienced amnesia-like distress in Hebrew and Greek quizzes. It is true that studying theology is somewhat tough and requires efforts, but this spiritual pursuit also brought me peace and joy; I found my faith solid and authentic.

Creating a Space for Understanding Faith

Thanks to God's grace for letting me understand faith and experience life renewal. It dawned on me that learning is creating a space for understanding faith. Having been a Christian for over thirty years, I thought I know Jesus Christ; yet I was merely knowing something about Him. I thought I was passionate about God's ministry and serving enthusiastically. Being the Lord's Disciple in Everyday Life

n a trice, I finished the two-year program of Master in Christian Studies. In a trice, I have to leave the Hong Kong Baptist Theological Seminary (HKBTS).

Began School with a "Problem Awareness"

I can still remember one of the reasons that I decided to enroll this course was due to my participation in a theological thinking workshop held by Prof. Andres Tang in the "Theonous" Bible Conference. It was in 2016. Prof. Tang led the participants to reflect on what theology is required in the current social and political context of Hong Kong. He commented that churches in Hong Kong are unable to respond to the present social situation

because we have not made a serious effort to think about those issues. The Church's inability to make a response is indeed a consequence of reaping what she sowed in the past. However, it is better than nothing if we are aware of the problem now and begin to think. Thus I began school at HKBTS with this "problem awareness"; hopefully I would be able to think about those related questions for the Church with those who share the same concern.

Start with the Basics

In fact, these are not easy questions to sort out. Moreover, the theological studies in these two years were quite hectic

that I did not have much time to reflect and ponder on those issues. Yet, I know that "equipping myself with the basics" is really important. Also, every practice of faith in the Church and among believers should be examined and restrained by theology. For this reason, although I seemed not to counter "directly" the above-mentioned problems of Hong Kong churches in the past two years, I still believe this two-year learning is immensely significant.

Communion with the Saints

First, I deeply realized the comprehensiveness and profoundness of theology and how it touches people. Having learned about how various theologians organized the gospel revealed by the Triune God in Jesus Christ, and expressed their results in theological statements, I am deeply touched. It is because these are the fruits of the theological reasoning of believers in history when they chased and engaged in the works of the Triune God in this realm. Also, these efforts are ultimately for witnessing and adoring God: God has never abandoned this world of suffering; He still works and delivers salvation in this world; and the Reality of God is revealed to us here and now through the gospel of Jesus Christ. Whenever I think of myself actually joining all the saints in history, thinking collectively about how the Church can faithfully participate in the salvation work of the Triune God in, to and for the world, I know this is a tremendous blessing and this moves me profoundly.

"Doing Great Things" and "Everyday Life"

Moreover, in these two years, I realized that I have exaggerated the question "how the Church can respond to the current social and political context of Hong Kong." I thought that only if we develop a "Hong Kong theology" or a certain kind of "local theology" could we be "responding" to the current situation in Hong Kong. This assumption is probably a symptom of being poisoned by Modernism with a tendency to pursue "greatness." Such an approach which appears "down-to-earth" could be, however, quite "in the clouds"; because it may possibly neglect or bypass the faith practice of the Church and believers.

On the contrary, I become more and more convinced that Christian faith is not about greatness, or the so-called "doing great things"; instead, it could be rather "simple" — being faithful as the Lord's disciple as we play our roles in everyday life. Of course, I am not saying that Christians should not "do great things"; if God sends you to "do great things," go ahead. However, most of us are "ordinary people," and everyday life is the context where

we as "ordinary people" fight for our cause. For Christians, this means we can live as the Lord's faithful disciples in everyday life. The world is full of "doublespeak"; Christians endeavor to talk about truth in daily life; we speak the truth because our God is the Truth. The world is heartless: Christians endeavor to take care of and love those who are not being loved in their daily life, for our God is Love. The world pays back evil with evil; Christians endeavor to accept and forgive one another in our daily life, for our God forgives us first. I believe the Triune God uses every Christian who faithfully tries to be the Lord's disciple in their everyday life and through them influences the world subtly. This is, in fact, the everyday politics of Christians or being the Lord's disciples. Maybe it is a more practical and "down-toearth" approach in response to the current social and political situation in Hong Kong, and the Church has been commissioned to train faithful disciples.

I believe the Triune God uses every Christian who faithfully try to be the Lord's disciple in their everyday life and through them influences the world subtly.

In retrospect of these two years of theological training, I earnestly find that what I learned was yet essential basics. I am now searching for direction, and I will leave this to God's guidance. Finally, thanks to God and HKBTS for granting me a chance to learn theology formally. No matter where I will be, may God help me to be His faithful disciple, glorifying Him and benefiting others!

Embarking on a Spiritual Voyage



How Do I Know God's Will for My Life?

There are a number of problems with this view. Firstly, even in the Bible only a few people are called to follow God's will according to this meaning of the term. For example, there were many godly people in the days of Isaiah, Jeremiah and Ezekiel but only these men were called to be prophets. Therefore, we should be wary about generalizing their experience for all believers. Secondly, even for those who were specifically called, there is no evidence that every aspect of their lives was regulated by God's commands. As far as we know, God only gave them specific commands that were related to their ministries. For example, God did not give Abraham directions about how to get from Haran to Canaan nor did he tell Joshua whom to marry.

On a more practical level, nobody follows the socalled "Dot" theory for ordinary, everyday decisions. We will give up after a few hours if we have to find out God's will about what to eat for lunch, what to wear for work, or whether we should bring an umbrella with us when we go out, each time, all the time! Furthermore, in many of these decisions it is almost impossible to argue that one decision is God's will rather than another. For example, could we sincerely believe that eating chicken rice rather than pizza is God's will for our lunch? More seriously, it may permit immature believers to justify unwise decisions on the grounds that "God told me to do it."This is the nuclear bomb of spiritual rationalization; all objections are annihilated before this declaration. Similarly, some believers may let circumstances or

iscovering God's will in our personal lives is a concern for many Christians. In this essay I would like to discuss an approach called "The Way of Wisdom" proposed by Garry Friesen in his book, Decision Making and the Will of God.[†] The following is an integration of some of his ideas with my understanding of Scripture. Interested readers should consult his book for more details.

What Is the Meaning of God's Will?

To begin with, what is the meaning of God's will? There are three possible answers to this question: 1) God's sovereign will. This refers to his plan for everything that happens in the universe. For example, salvation history is part of God's sovereign will for humanity. 2) God's moral will. This refers to God's commands in the Bible and how humans ought to believe and live their lives. In most instances in the Bible, the will of God refers to his moral will. 3) God's individual will for each person. This is something we cannot know from reading the Bible alone.

"Dot" Theory

The third meaning is what most Christians mean when they say that they want to know God's will for their lives. According to the traditional view, the correct decision is a "dot," i.e., only one choice is the correct choice. If we miss that opportunity to follow God's will, then we have missed out on God's ideal path for our lives. For example, if Abraham did not go from Haran to Canaan he would have missed God's perfect will for his life. What this means today is that if we do not marry "the chance dictate their decision on the grounds that they are "putting out a fleece" (Igs 6:36-40). Instead of taking responsibility for their own decisions, this allows some to hide behind the invisibility cloak of circumstance.

God's Moral Will

According to Friesen, God's moral will should be our first consideration. If something is prohibited in the Bible, it is not an option. He uses Genesis 2:16-17 as an illustration. In this passage all the fruits of the Garden of Eden were available to Adam and Eve. Only the fruits of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil were prohibited. Adam and Eve did not have to worry about whether eating apple, orange, or fig was God's will. According to him, the "Dot" theory reverses the picture so that all the fruits were prohibited except for one. What Friesen's theory means in practice is that we have a choice in whom to marry but having sex outside of marriage is not an option.

So what if the decision involves non-moral choices? The choice is no longer between right or wrong but good or bad decision. In these cases Christians are supposed to exercise their God-given wisdom. Scriptural support for this includes Romans 14:5 which says, "One person esteems one day as better than another, while another esteems all days alike. Each one should be fully convinced in his own mind" and I Corinthians 7:40 which says, "Yet in my judgment she is happier if she remains as she is. And I think that I too have the Spirit of God."* In the Old Testament, the corpus of Wisdom Literature teaches a person to differentiate between good and bad choices, many of which are non-moral choices (Prv 10:4-5; 11:2, 15).

God's Sovereign Will

What about the sovereign will of God? What role does it have in this approach to the will of God? According to Friesen, God's sovereign will does not exclude the need for planning; it just means that we have to submit to his will humbly. Circumstance should not be equated with God's will; it is merely the context of the decision and it must be weighed with wisdom. For example, if the building I am in is on fire, I should not

take it to mean that it is God's will for me to die. Wisdom tells me I should get out and live for God. Friesen gives scriptural examples of an open door that was taken (I Cor I 6:8-9), prayer for an open door (Col 4:3), and an open door that was not taken (2 Cor 2:12-



13). His point is that not all open doors (i.e., available choices) should be considered God's will. In general, the sovereign will of God is not something we can discern or discern clearly at any given time. Therefore, making a personal decision on the basis that it is the sovereign will of God is not wise.

"The Way of Wisdom" in Practice

How do all these work out in practice? The first thing to do is, of course, to make sure that our decision is *not against the teachings of the Bible*. Note that this is different from, for example, believers who claim that God is leading them to Thailand to be missionaries based on their reading of Abraham's call (Gn 12:1-3). This is a personal experience between the believer and God mediated via the Bible. It cannot be made into a principle that all believers should follow. What we are talking about are Biblical teachings that should be followed by all believers.

There is a role for *circumstances* in our pursuit of God's will, of course. God's opening or closing of a door could be significant. Incidentally, Gideon was not seeking God's will when he put out the fleece. By that time he was very certain about what God wanted him to do. He put out the fleece because his faith was weak and he was afraid. According to Friesen, it should be used infrequently and only for more important decisions. Furthermore, select a sign that is clear, definite, and somewhat uncommon (i.e., where there is not a 50%

chance of it happening).

The inner witness of the Holy Spirit is also important, i.e., whether we have inner peace with a certain decision. I wish to caution that this is a subjective feeling and should not be the main reason for a decision. I've known quite a number of believers who struggle with whether or not to break up with their boy or girl friend. Once the decision is made to break up, most tell me that they feel a sense of peace. I think their sense of peace comes from having made the decision itself. Also, there must have been conflicts prior to the consideration to break up. Thus, breaking up means the end of the conflicts. I think these factors, more than simply following the will of God, explain their sense of peace. Nevertheless, coupled with prayer (and perhaps fasting) a sense of peace could be an indication of God's leading.

Seeking the counsel of mature Christians who know us and care for us is also very helpful. According to the way of wisdom, we need to exercise wisdom in making decisions. However, we may not have the required wisdom or experience to make the correct decision in a matter we have not encountered before. Furthermore, we may be too caught up in the spirit of the moment or unable to view the issue from a different perspective. Getting a second opinion or perspective from older, wiser Christians can be enlightening. It could confirm what we want or caution us against our decision.

Our personal desire should not be ignored either. We should avoid the two extremes of pandering to our desire or denying it altogether. I have known seminary students who think that God has called them exactly because they do not want to serve the LORD full-time. This is bad theology. God does not want us to suffer unnecessarily. The other extreme is also wrong. In my experience, many people want to know God's will because



they think that following God's will brings happiness and success. The proof of following God's will, then, is happiness and success. If so, we will have a tendency to base our decision on what makes us happy or successful. However, this is skewed thinking. Jesus and many believers suffered exactly because they were following God's will. We should not think that following God's will would necessarily bring

happiness. On the contrary, it may bring us a lot of suffering.

The way of wisdom also emphasizes common sense. As Friesen says, God gives us common sense to use so we should not ignore it. This should not be a problem except that many Christians identify common sense with lack of faith. One of the great things about faith in Christ is that it empowers believers to move beyond their comfort zone, to reach heights they would normally not dare to dream about. On the flip side, it also encourages some believers to indulge in wishful thinking that defies common sense. What separates wishful thinking from genuine faith? According to my understanding, faith is when we step out boldly to do what God has commanded us to do. This is certainly true when it concerns obeying biblical teachings (e.g., to fulfill the Great Commission, to fight for justice for the oppressed). Wishful thinking is when we indulge our own personal desires beyond common sense reasoning. Jesus has indeed said, "Ask, and it shall be given to you" (Mt 7:7) but that does not mean that everything we ask for is God's will or that we will get it. God will not give us stone if we ask for bread (Mt 7:9); conversely, it also means that if we ask for stone, he will only give us bread. He will give us what is good for us rather than just what we want, or nothing at all.

Finally, the way of wisdom does not rule out *supernatural guidance* like an audible voice, angel, vision, dream, prophecy, or miracle. These are all found in the Bible and were ways that God communicated with his people. Nevertheless, these were not common even in Biblical times. Otherwise people would not be so astonished and awestruck when they happened. Therefore, we should not expect them to be common today. Even when we think we have contacted with the spiritual realm we should be careful. This is because not all spirits are from the LORD. It is our duty to test every spirit to see whether they are from the LORD or not (1]n 4:1-3).

Academic Affairs News

Opening Convocation in the New School Year

The Opening Convocation Ceremony for 2018-19 was held on August 28, and President Joshua Cho preached a message titled "Communitas." He pointed out that according to Colossians 3:1-14, in a true community of disciples, each member both embraces the differences and varieties in the group, and maintains the uniqueness of its identity and conviction, namely the story of Jesus Christ becoming the life story of each member in the community. It is a story of "love." Love is the sine qua non (essential condition) of a disciple community.

• Opening Convocation Lecture

The lecture was held on August 29. Dr. Lindsay Robertson, Associate Professor of Christian Thought (Theology and Philosophy), presented a lecture titled "Beauty, Art and Being: Some Dimensions of Personal Identity."

• Full-Time Ministry Exploration Camp

The seminary organized a Full-Time Ministry Exploration Camp from October 19 to 20 for Christians exploring the possibility of full-time ministry. Participants got to hear sharing on the call to ministry, experience what a class at HKBTS is like, and meet our professors and students. The Chaplain, Rev. Brian Lam, held a workshop on "Discernment, Life, and Calling," and Dr. Clement Shum, Assistant Professor of New Testament, shared a message. This camp allowed participants to reflect more deeply on God's calling, experience campus life of students, and learn more about the programs of study at HKBTS.

• Baptist Heritage Week

Baptist Heritage Week was held from October 23 to 25 (10:00-11:00 am) on the Sai O Campus. Its main theme was "Baptist Ecclesiology After Whiteness." Rev. Dr. Mikael N. Broadway, Associate Professor of Theology and Ethics in the Shaw University Divinity

School, presented a series of lectures about his study on Baptist ecclesiology with focus around how modernity and white supremacy have distorted and damaged the church, and how to work toward overcoming these sinful failures to be God's people.

Conflicts and Reconciliation: A Note on the Spiritual Formation Camp 2018

With "koinonia" (fellowship) as its theme, HKBTS Spiritual Formation Camp held on August 15-17 this year discussed how we may manage conflicts and bring about reconciliation.

Prof. Andres Tang shared a message titled "Preparing Ourselves for a New Community." He approached the issue with the concept of "strangeness." A new community is a strange community. For year I students, HKBTS is a strange community; for the graduating class, the first field they serve as minister will be a strange community unless they return to serve in their own church. Prof. Tang reminded us that instead of eliminating

this strangeness as quickly as possible, we should always stay fresh and open ourselves to keep finding out more about the community and making ourselves known to the community. After all, "fellowship" means living together and getting along. It is neither something to be avoided nor romanticized.

In the morning of the last day, before we took communion, Dr. Sarah Shea preached a sermon on I John I:I-4. The topic was "Fellowship amid Conflicts in the Church." She reminded us that the real foundation for fellowship is Jesus Christ and the Word. What should we do when faced with conflicts? We should examine our true nature in front of God's throne of grace. That is the beginning of reconciliation.

On the second day of the camp, we looked back on students' real life experience of conflicts and reconciliation. Dr. Freeman Huen invited a couple of fresh graduates to share with us their experience of conflicts with their classmates in the past few years and how they reconciled. Dr. Huen guided them to talk about their experience of reconciliation, especially the difficulty of reopening the door to communication after the conflicts, how they overcame the communication obstacles, and how they experienced God's work in the process. One of the graduates even shared with us what he learnt being a channel of His peace.

In the afternoon on the second day, every class except year I students formed a group to have a discussion led by a teacher on their experience of conflicts and reconciliation and the difficulties they faced. In this safe setting, some of the classes even honestly brought up the clashes they came across as they lived together at the seminary.

"Fellowship" means "life together" and "being with" (each other). Yet when a group of (justified) sinners live together, conflicts and problems are inevitable. We are not counting on just one camp to heal the wounds from the past; what we are hoping for is to take this camp as an opportunity to learn to deal with the issue as a faith community. If we do not learn how to manage conflicts and bring about reconciliation in the relatively safe environment of a seminary, we are even less likely to learn it when we have conflicts with fellow ministers or co-workers as we serve in local churches or institutions. We have seen a lot of ministers who divide the work without cooperating with

one another, and there are times when ministers call one another "co-worker" but cannot work together. May God have mercy on us; may the Holy Spirit renew the churches!

A Brand New Start with our New Program

Our department's new program, the "Master of Arts in Christian Studies Program" (M.A.C.S.), is kicking off this October! Every one of our 17 new students is diligent and enthused believers' leader; some of them are deacons or department heads at churches, and some are co-workers at Christian institutions. They are willing to put in their effort, time, and money for biblical and theological training, preparing for the challenge from life and ministry, and working to improve their spiritual life and ministry.

Students in the evening program are usually from a wide age range. In the past, most students enrolled in degree programs were in their middle age. It is especially delighting that our M.A.C.S. program has two students in their twenties who choose to receive theological training, devoting their prime years to the Lord when they are in their best position to build the foundation for their career. With different background and faith stories, the 17 new students are all firmly devoted to ministry and learning. Here are some of their messages and expectations:

"Nowadays our society is full of sophistries when it becomes hard to tell the true from the false. There are so many different values that we cannot tell which is right... What does the Bible teach us on these issues? How would Jesus respond if He lived among us today? ...I reckon that I understand too little about the Bible and think too little about my faith, so I hope I can develop a set of biblical principles for my life after taking this program."

"Branches that remain in Christ build their lives on the rock, thanks not to ministry works, activities nor relationship with people, but to every word that comes from the mouth of God. I long to study God's word. May the Holy Spirit help me understand His word, and save me from losing heart and turning from the road of ministry."

"As a youngster who grew up in the church, I have witnessed a number of brothers and sisters overwhelmed or even taken in by worldly information and values. I need better equipment with biblical and theological training, a more profound experience in the faith and in ministry, and broader horizons so that I may inspire young people around me to reflect on faith and encourage them to hold on to Christian values."

"Since 1997, Hong Kong has undergone tremendous economic, social, and political changes over the last two decades. How would the Christian faith respond to these transformations? Socio-political turmoil has triggered vigorous debates both inside and outside the church, causing conflicts that rip society apart in an unprecedented manner. By studying the Christian faith with a systematic and holistic approach, I hope I can have a better grip of the core of the faith. Such a process will not only help us improve and renew our spiritual life, but also enable us to better discern and respond to what is happening in our society."

"For a long time, I have been pondering the idea of taking a theological program for lay believers, but I was always too busy to take action. Midway upon the journey of my life, I told myself I should not spend all my time making a living. I decided to humbly submit to God's guidance. By taking this program, I may equip myself with a more systematic understanding of the Bible so as to improve my ministry and gospel preaching."

While every student embarks on this new journey with their own expectations, I believe it is not mere coincidence that they meet in this program. I pray that they will encourage one another on their academic journey, bringing new motivation to themselves and to the group as a whole. May God accept their commitment and guide their learning so that they experience His teaching, molding, and blessing even more in the coming years.
