A New Beginning

Many a time man lives in sin, separated from God and unable to experience God's presence. From our reading of scriptures or from what we experience in our daily lives, we know that men and women continually sin against God. From the beginning of Genesis, we see human seeking to become gods instead of listening to the one true God.

The situation has become more obvious today. Modern society is flooded with falsehood, drowning our senses and dampening our ability to tell right from wrong. For as long as we can remember, we have been misled by lies such as "man is born innocent," and "man is rational." We are asked to believe that men and women are born with a preference for peace, and that they can be self-contained, not needing to depend on others or trust in God. We are told that if we want to be happy, we must satisfy all our desires. If nations want to create peace and prosperity, they need to use power, especially military might. Believing all these claims, men and women like to put everything under their control, but it is a pity that they become entangled with this and that kind of sin, unable to become aware of God's presence in the world he has created. As a result, men and women become separated from God and feel that God has abandoned them.

However, God is offering us his love. He has sent Jesus Christ to save the world, proclaiming the gospel of repentance, leading people back to the right track. Jesus Christ proclaims, "The time has come. The kingdom of God is near. Repent and believe the good news!" (Mark I:15) What God's proclamation and judgment bring is not destruction but a new life and transformation. Each person needs faith to experience this new beginning. We need faith to experience a new beginning.

The Grace of Judgment

If we have eyes of faith, we can see that

God's judgment brings new beginnings and that God's righteousness and mercy stir up a heart to repent. God's judgment requires that we repent from treacherous violence. This is like a man who has been afflicted with some malignant disease and the whole body is covered with horrible tumors that need to be removed one by one. The removal of these tumors is bound to bring about pain, but this process leads to a new life.

Considered from this angle, repentance is the determination to forsake the world with its deceit and lies: acknowledge the self-righteous lies and mistakes of the past; dispense with bad habits, overcome desires and forsake idols. Repentance is the determination to face the true light and experience God's redemption. It may be likened to one who gets lost in a forest at night and becomes scared. Suddenly, a rain storm breaks the silence. The fool just stares at the lightning, making him to be even more scared; the wise man would use the brightness of the lightning to find a way to escape from the forest.

A wise person knows that as long as God's grace remains, nothing is impossible. When a wise man or woman feels trapped by the temptations of the world and its false customs does not know where to go, he or she will kneel down and pray, calling out to God: "Lord, help me! ... Yes, Lord, but even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." (Matthew 15:25-27) This is the approach that a person must take: He or she has persistently and constantly to ask God for help.

This is why, if we want to live in God's grace, we need to face the true light, reflect on our lives and repent wholeheartedly, asking the Lord to show mercy and help. When we begin to experience sin's control and have experienced the despair resulting from guilt and hatred, we need to confess and repent together, accepting the grace and forgiveness of God's judgment. Whenever we are willing to confess our sin, sin at once loses its grip on us.

No matter what the nature of sins we have committed and no matter in what situation we find ourselves, God's arms are still stretching out to embrace us. In the shining light of Christ's presence, God's judgment is an invitation beckoning man to experience true happiness and to know freedom through repentance.

The Gift of Prayer

To set out on the road of happiness, to accept God's invitation and to inherit the grace of freedom, we respond to God in prayers. Jesus prays in response to the Father, calling his disciples to pray. We must always pray to God.

A pilgrim once asked Abba Agathon, "Which of the virtues calls for the most human effort?" Agathon replied, "Prayer." He has pointed out to us that prayer is the prime virtue over all. Virtue is a totality of sight, senses, thought, action and existence, while prayer is a kind of virtue, allowing man to open himself to God's grace. The practice of prayer is to be present in God's grace as a means of growing in God's love. Therefore, in life where a person is bound to meet with many levels of difficulties, he needs to pray unceasingly. The practice of prayer is a man's long-term effort and battle until the day when he returns to his heavenly home; Satan also knows most profoundly that as long as he successfully impedes a man or a woman from praying, this person cannot advance.

However, the virtue of prayer cannot be achieved by man's efforts. Prayer is a gift of God's grace. When someone prays, God is present with him. This is God's grace, not the result of any human effort. In contrast to the length, height, breadth and depth of God's grace, man's effort becomes insignificant. All the good deeds a person does (such as faith, love and prayer) are God's gifts. All that man can do in response to God's love is faith; salvation is made possible through faith.

Our response to God in faith and God's grace are closely intertwined. Man's response and God's grace alternate in the sphere of prayer. Prayer and life must be like the body and its shadow, being always together, harmonious and of one accord. Otherwise, man's own effort without God's help is futile, and as our daily living will swallow us up so that we cannot draw closer to God

The words of the apostle Paul reveal his understanding of how our prayers open us to experience God's grace. He says in Romans 8:26-27: "The Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express. The God who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints in accordance with God's will." Paul's meaning is that not only does the Spirit help us when we do not know how to pray, but when we pray he also gives us the words to pray for our needs. When we are praying to experience God and to believe in him, God will be present in our midst. Real prayer takes place when a person looks for God; prayer becomes the means by which we respond to God's grace. If we look for God, he will manifest himself to us; if we embrace God, he will stay with us.

A Seminary of Prayer

We have had such an experience: we lost our way in a dark forest, feeling scared. But then, there is a sudden rain storm breaking the silence. In the brightness of lightning, we see a way before us.

During the past two to three weeks, illuminated by the light of Jesus Christ's presence, we have been called to repent, to fly to freedom, and to set out on a fresh new direction. I joyfully behold and gaze on our Seminary's new road stretching out before us. I see teachers, students and staff drawing together looking for God and asking God to manifest himself to us as we all embrace God, asking him to stay with us.

• Spiritual Formation Camp (Aug 20-21) The theme for this year's camp was "Listen ...," the purpose was to allow each of us to learn to be waiting silently and listening in God's presence just before the school term begins. In our hymn-singing sessions, teachers and students took the initiative to come close to God, resting on his bosom and listening attentively to his voice. In the prayer session, students prayed freely and honestly for the Seminary and for all members of the Seminary community in times of trouble. Our students knelt and prayed to God: "Our Lord God, help us, have mercy on us!"

• The Seminary-wide Prayer Meeting (Aug 28) What is special about this semester is that we have advanced the Seminary-wide Prayer Meeting to the beginning of the school year. We deliberately designated the third chapel for everyone at the Seminary to devote ourselves to pray to God, making our Seminary a place of renewal and prayer. This reflects our desire to make the inner life of the Seminary our first concern as we set out in a new direction with a new vision and purpose: We bow before God knowing he is our only reliable guide.

Before the prayer meeting, we called together all the staff so that we could share with them our dreams and plans for the Seminary's future development, urging them to join us as we go forth with God beside us no matter how strong the winds or how high the waves. This is what we all can see: HKBTS is like a ship and we are all on board and are in need of a heart of unity as we cleave together breaking the waves to advance. In face of all kinds of difficulties, we are just like the Canaanite woman, kneeling before Jesus and asking in humility, "Lord, help me! ... Yes, Lord, but even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table."

• Morning Prayer Meeting (beginning Sep 3, 8:00-8:30 am every Wed and Fri) The first Morning Prayer Meeting of the school year was led by Dr. Desmond Choi, who made the adjustment of new students his major concern. The second meeting was led by M.Div. 2 students who prayed for the spiritual atmosphere of the Seminary. The third meeting was led by Dr. Wong Fook-kong, with the purpose of praying for the M.Div. 3 students.

What made me especially feel touched was, on the afternoon of the first Morning Prayer Meeting, new students from M.Div. I took the initiative to show concern about the many levels of difficulties the Seminary faced recently and about its urgent needs. We talked for an hour and a half, sharing the challenges and praying to God for the future of the Seminary.

• The Seminary Silent Prayer and Fasting Meeting (beginning Sep 4, 12:30-2:00 pm every Wed) The theme for the first meeting was "Fixing Our Eyes on Jesus, Confession and Prayer." The content included a PowerPoint presentation, hymn-singing, silence and meditative prayer. Beginning with PowerPoint in the first half hour, individual participants were to be silent and did meditative prayer, then students led the following hour of hymn-singing and Bible reading. There were over 70 people from the faculty, students and staff joining the

meeting, seeking God's illumination and examining their hearts in God's presence, and confessing their sins before God and praying earnestly for God's guidance. The theme of the second meeting was "God's holiness" with over 80 faculty, students and staff present.

Sitting in their midst, I could see: We revered the true light, made sincere confession and received enlightenment so that we could ask God for help and mercy. Together we confessed before God, repented for our sins and received God's grace in judgment and God's forgiveness. We were willing to confess our sin so that sin would completely lose its grip on us.

• New Students' Sharing at Morning Chapel (beginning Sep II) This school year we have invited new students to give a testimony of how God has called them to full time ministry. Through their stories, we hope to see the work and grace of God through our different life paths and so give glory to God. Three students from M.Div. I program shared their testimonies and recounted how God led their families to change, accepting their decision to study in the Seminary. After that, Dr. Desmond Choi led us to pray, asking God to mold them to be God's crack troop and faithful, righteous servants. We truly desire to know the will of the Holy Spirit who "intercedes for the saints in accordance with God's will" (Romans 8:27).

My Prayer

In these few years I am increasingly led to pray. God teaches me how to pray; my fellow co-workers teach me how to pray as a community. I think about prayer; I study and write about prayer; I put prayer into practice. We as a seminary community pray together. I increasingly understand: Despite difficulties, each one being bigger than the other, we must continue to pray; if we stop praying, it will be hard for us to advance. I increasingly understand: God grants our beloved Seminary grace so that it can be a seminary of prayer. I dream and see that our Seminary is not only a seminary emphasizing academic competence of the faculty and students but also on a community committed to prayer. My hope and fervent prayer is that: Our prayer life and our daily life will become like the body and its shadow, being always together, harmonious and of one accord. In prayer we look for God, embrace him and invite him to stay with us. Our seminary is not only a seminary of prayer, but also a hymn-singing seminary as we keep on singing out the wonderful work that God has done in our midst.

Explore the New World

The Seminary-wide Prayer Meeting: Commence the New School Year and Explore the New World with Prayer

For the first time, the Seminary-wide Prayer Meeting was advanced to be held on the third chapel in the new school year. This is because we hope that all the faculty, students and staff will begin the new school year with prayer, asking the Lord to use us, a group of weak and lowly people, to explore how the new world built on this piece of land can continue to glorify him.

In the meeting, we heard four scriptural passages: Exodus 33:12-23; Psalm 44; Ephesians 2:13-18; Mark 4:35-41. Then, we all prayed earnestly for the Seminary after each scriptural reading. In the final prayer session, we spread out, holding hands and encircling the chapel to form the shape of a ship. Hearing the prayer of Acting President, Dr. Joshua Cho, we echoed in our hearts that the Lord would instruct and lead the whole seminary community and grant us the strength to sail forth, breaking the waves.

Before the prayer meeting, our Acting President, Dr. Joshua Cho, met with all the staff to encourage everyone to do our best in our own posts even when we face difficulties. We must continue to trust in God and to walk with the Seminary as it actively repairs the damage on the one hand and keeps

advancing on the other hand.

The chaplain, Rev. Brian Lam, led the meeting as all the faculty, students and staff prayed for our proper position in God's plan. They also asked God to lead us to meet with all the challenges and changes, and asked God to prepare a new president after God's heart.

The campus design of HKBTS is modeled after the outside of a ship. To us, HKBTS is a ship sailing forth. In the meeting, the Acting President led us to pray to the one who has always been with us during the storm and the waves so that we do not forget his orders and promises and that he would continue to lead us as we sail forth.

A Reflection on the Handling of Historical Data and Statistics of Hong Kong Churches from a Study of Hong Kong Denominations

From July 2006 to June 2007, I contributed articles for the "Tracing the Origins of Hong Kong Churches" series in Christian Times. The purposes of these articles are to search for the origins of the faith and doctrines, traditional rituals and ceremonies, denominational structure of today's Chinese churches in Hong Kong. Within the series, the introduction of the historical roots of each denomination drew the most attention. This suggests that the Chinese church members tend to be rather confused and do not have a clear understanding as to why so many denominations exist. They hope to know these denominations better in order to clarify the complicated relationships among them. Upon the request of a publishing company, I decided to produce a book entitled A Survey of Hong Kong's Ten Denominations. This book is a comprehensive exploration of the origins and development, faith and polity and the up-to-date overall situations of ten major denominations in Hong Kong.

To complete the study, I set out to collect all the historical information and statistical data, carefully study many periodicals and annual reports, and make contact and visit various major Christian denominations. Through the process of researching and writing this book, I have got a better grasp on the ways each major denomination in Hong Kong handles historical data and statistical figures. In this article, I would like to share briefly the phenomena I have discovered. Although I contacted only ten denominations, they are all having a sizable church community with a good number of denominational churches and each having a rather big congregation

and each denomination provides a wide range of social services. This reflects significantly the overall picture of Christian churches in Hong Kong.

I. Hard Facts of Denominational History

It is true that all of Hong Kong's major denominations have fairly detailed records of their own origins and development, but there are cases when the data presented are inconsistent and contradictory, and the given historical descriptions are vague and lopsided. The reasons can be classified into the following two categories.

(I) Deficiency of Historical Data

When a Chinese church was founded, it was mostly run by western missionaries, and when they left, they took home with them the missionary records. Furthermore, as there was a lack of interest in preserving historical data, many historical documents were lost and subsequently past historical facts can by no means be reconstructed. For example, the Baptist Convention of Hong Kong (BCHK) was founded in 1938. At first, there were only three independent churches: the Hong Kong Baptist Church, Cheung Chau Baptist Church and Aberdeen Baptist Church, together with three gospel centers at Yau Ma Tei, Kowloon City and Hung Hom respectively. A significant milestone in the Baptist Convention of Hong Kong came when it was joined by a group of Swatow churches. However, I could not find any records to reveal exactly when this group actually joined BCHK. No one whom I contacted could give an accurate date for Swatow churches' joining. What I can be sure is that

this must have taken place in or before 1955 when the annual general meeting of BCHK was held at Kowloon City Swatow Baptist Church. ¹

If the development of a denomination or a church is simple and clear, despite poor documentation in the past, its historical facts can somehow be deduced. However, there exists complex evolution in the history of many Hong Kong churches, making it hard to trace back the true origins. For example, the Hong Kong Lutheran Church and the Hong Kong and Macau Lutheran Church had branched out from the same denomination but got separated before the 1970s. That is why some of the earliest churches of the Hong Kong Lutheran Church can now only be found in the Hong Kong and Macau Lutheran Church's history. This may sound odd to those who do not understand the subtle historical development involved.² Another example, the Tiu Keng Leng Church was regarded as the very first church founded by the Christian and Missionary Alliance Churches Union of Hong Kong. Today there are three different churches, which are C. & M. Alliance Ling Yan Church, C. & M. Alliance Hau Tak Church and New Rennie's Mill Alliance Church, each claiming to be related to or as an extension of this church. Their intricate relationship can hardly be sorted out without going through historical records.

(2) A Lack of Historical Study

For reasons of keeping the records in archive or regarding them as confidential, the first hand records of churches are usually not open to the public so that outsider researchers are denied access to them. In such cases, to get to know the history of a denomination or a church, one can only resort to secondary sources such as an annual bulletin or report. However, when these historical records are compared and closely examined, one sometimes finds that the churches themselves do not have a comprehensive understanding of their own history causing the records to appear vague and contradictory. For example, the Twentieth Anniversary Publication of the Baptist Convention of Hong Kong recorded that when BCHK was founded, the Hong Kong Baptist Church had 1,530 members, while Cheung Chau Baptist Church had 25 and Aberdeen Baptist Church

had 223 with a total membership of the churches being 1,778.³ It is a pity that in the subsequent Fortieth, Fiftieth and Sixtieth Anniversary Publications, that figure was mistakenly written as 1,178.⁴ This clearly shows that this mistake passed down from generation to generation.

Another common problem in handling secondary sources of information has been to do with the principle or the way of handling the historical records varies from one person to the next, often causing readers to feel confused. How should we fix the date of a church's founding: the day it was open for ministry or when it was formally founded as a church? In case when the religious organization that set up the church ceased to provide subvention or moved elsewhere, how then should we fix the date of its establishment? For example, the Hong Kong Baptist Church used to claim its history to begin with the founding of Queen's Road Baptist Church in 1842 but that church was closed soon after its founding. Although some western missionaries tried to keep the church running from 1860 to 1865, it was not until 1880 that regular church meetings were formally resumed.⁵ On the contrary, the C. & M. Alliance Hebron Church, originating from the Hebron Church founded in 1915 in Nan Hai, Guangdong and later moved to Hong Kong due to a change of political regime in China in 1949. However, since the church was reconstructed in 1962 and joined the Christian and Missionary Alliance Churches Union of Hong Kong, it was regarded as a more recently founded church and was even placed on the church list below those churches founded in the fifties. Obviously, the former's founding date is based on that of its predecessor while the latter is not. Of course, how a church's predecessor should be reckoned is a question worthy of further investigation. In the historical development of the two churches mentioned above, the assets and polity of the old have not been continued in the new church. It is the ministerial staff and church membership which have been continued. In this case, can we say the new church is a direct continuation of the old one?

It is interesting to note that the two churches mentioned above are members of the Baptist Convention of Hong Kong and the Christian and Missionary Alliance Churches Union of Hong Kong respectively, and yet their seminaries handled their histories in just the opposite way. Applying the principles of continuation of the ministerial staff and church membership as evidence of a hereditary relationship, then we can establish that the predecessor of the Hong Kong Baptist Theological Seminary owned by the Baptist Convention of Hong Kong is the Guangdung and Guangxi Divinity School founded in approximately 1870 in Guang Zhou, Guangdong Province. The Divinity School was closed down as the Communist regime took power and moved to Hong Kong where it resumed in 1951 under the name of the Divinity School of the Baptist Convention of Hong Kong and in 1963 was renamed Hong Kong Baptist Theological Seminary. As for the seminary linked with the Christian Alliance Church, its predecessor was Alliance College founded in 1899 at Wu Zhou in Guang Xi province and renamed Alliance Bible College in 1938. It moved to Hong Kong in 1949 and was renamed Alliance Bible Seminary in 1955. On the surface, the historical development of the two seminaries was rather close, yet the former took 1951 as its founding year without including the history of its predecessor, while the latter claims it to have begun in 1899, since it includes the history of its predecessor.⁶

2. Statistical Data of a Denomination

In the last twenty years, the Hong Kong Church Renewal Movement Ltd. has conducted a large scale census of local churches every five years, noting in detail different data like the number of people attending church meetings, male to female ratio, age distribution, level of education and occupation; and giving us an impression that the numerical records of Hong Kong churches are fairly complete. However, my experience gained from this study suggests that the general condition is not so ideal.

(1) Insufficient Statistical Investigation

Although many large local denominations have published their annual reports setting out the various developments and statistical data of the past year in detail, there are a number of denominations which do not make regular investigations or keep numerical records of their member churches. The two denominations, Assemblies of God Ministry and Pentecostal Holiness

Church, each with a total membership of over 10,000, are typical examples. When I asked for the figures of church service attendance and church membership, they could not immediately provide those figures; however, they were helpful in collecting the required information for the completion of my study. Besides, this is also true to individual churches. For example, the International Christian Assembly offers a number of worship services in different languages, but it does not have a membership system as the Filipino or Indonesian domestic helpers only stay temporarily in Hong Kong causing the attendants' mobility rate to be fairly high and making it hard to count its members. Meanwhile, since it does not register the church attendance, when I asked the church about the figures, it only gave a rough estimation of about 3,000. Similar conditions can be seen in other Englishspeaking churches, such as the Methodist International Church, Hong Kong.

Even if a denomination or a church does have a regular statistical survey, the data collected may not be altogether reliable; this may be due to inconsistency in the statistical principle followed, resulting in figures that are far from accurate or misleading. For example, some denominations still keep those members who have passed away, emigrated overseas or lost contact in the membership list and so their total membership remains abnormally high. I have found according to this principle that the average church attendance of the member churches of one denomination being only 4,100 while its total membership is as high as 14,000. To reflect the real condition, the Diocesan of Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui Office has recounted its members in recent years cutting the figure from 30,000 to 10,000. According to some reliable sources, some churches in Hong Kong would include the attendance of its local and overseas branch churches when counting its regular church attendance so as to give a much higher figure than the actual one.

(2) Obstacles in Handling Figures

Although some denominations have statistical figures, the way they handle those figures has sometimes set up obstacles for academic research. A typical example is that for confidential reasons they refuse to disclose the figures I asked for. For example, although

one denomination publishes its annual report and announces its statistical figures of the past year, when asked about the related information, the General Secretary of that denomination refused to provide those figures saying that they were confidential. That is why in my book A Survey of Hong Kong's Ten Denominations, nine denominations have the latest figures up to 2007 while the denomination I mentioned has the figures only up to 2006. Of course, there may be changes that one may not want to disclose to outsiders, such as internal strife and conflict in the church or a sudden drop in church attendance. Many denominations or churches are inclined to keep them a secret, and in fact, I came across this phenomenon for quite a few times during my study.

Besides deliberately keeping some figures secret or confidential, there are unintentional mistakes too, such as errors in copying or in simple calculation, which give obstacles to a study. One of the obvious examples can be seen in comparing the figures of the Baptist Convention of Hong Kong in the last two years. According to the annual report, the total average Sunday service attendance of member churches in 2006 was 38,969 whilst it was 35,618 in 2007, does that mean the church attendance of Hong Kong Baptist churches are on a drastic downfall? A drop of 3,351 in church attendance in a year's time would certainly be a crisis worthy of special attention. However, a simple comparison of the figures between member churches shows there has been a numerical growth in most churches, and so what actually is the problem? Upon closer observation, it was found that the church attendance figure of Aberdeen Baptist Church in 2006 had been mistakenly written as 8,536 and a follow-up investigation showed that it should be 875, a difference of 7,661. Taking away this miscalculated figure, there is an increase of 4,310 in the total of average church attendance of Baptist churches from 2006 to 2007. What a different, much more optimistic picture it shows as far as church growth is concerned!⁷ It is fortunate that this is an obvious mistake that can be easily spotted but it is hard to estimate how many minute errors there are that cannot be easily verified.

3. Reflection and Suggestions

The past history of a denomination or a church is the key to an understanding of its past church growth, helping us to know ourselves better, learn from the past and know more about the present. On the other hand, statistical figures are the evidence to master today's development and an important reference for evaluating the present and planning for the future. From the above discussion, there is still much room for improvement for Hong Kong churches in these two aspects. Here, I venture to make the following two appeals:

(I) Acknowledge Historical Study of a Denomination

Within the parameters of our ability, a denomination or a church should try its best to properly preserve historical documents as some historical data, once lost, can never be reconstructed; even worse is that the errors and confusion would perhaps linger, unable to be rectified. This is especially so given that the development of some of the churches in Hong Kong is rather complicated, there is a need for more elaborate historical records to make clear the intricate relationship involved. If the church space is too limited to preserve the collection of historical data, it is advisable to scan those documents and convert them into computer documents, or better still, donate them to a denominational seminary and put them in the archives.

Furthermore, the church should spare more resources for the study of its history so that a more accurate and detailed history can be compiled and written out. If possible, develop unified principles for handling historical data can avoid confusion, for example, to stick to the same principle of either to count the founding date of the earliest predecessor or only the date of its moving to Hong Kong. I understand that it is hard to change certain traditional practices, as it is impossible to say that the Alliance Bible Seminary has only a history of sixty years, just as it is hard to accept that Hong Kong Baptist Theological Seminary has had a long history of over 140 years. Perhaps every church organization should try hard to list out in detail the date when it was first founded and the date it moved to Hong Kong as this is a more useful way to clarify historical facts.

(2) Acknowledge Statistical Figures of a Denomination

To accurately master the real condition of and facilitate the study of Hong Kong churches, each of the churches should collect numerical data such as to count the church attendance and the amount of offerings received weekly and then the denomination to which the church belongs collects the data and does a statistical analysis every year. In case the statistical records are lost, it is often impossible to retrieve them. To count the figure correctly, a church should design some accurate and reliable ways to do their calculations: (i) Have someone to do the head count in the middle of the meeting; (ii) every one present records one's attendance; (iii) use modern technology such as the electronic membership card to do the counting. I once heard that a pastor of a big church only does a rough estimation of the service attendance and the number of its members. As a result, the actual attendance of over 100 becomes 300 whilst a church membership of over 600 becomes 400. This kind of calculation should be avoided. In doing the head count, churches should follow a unified standard to enable a fair comparison and avoid being misled. For example, church attendance should only include that of the mother church while attendance of branch churches should be listed out separately. Also for the church membership, only the active participating members should be counted; those who have passed away, migrated or lost contact over a long period of time should be deducted from the total.

As the church is a big family and we are its household members, I do not understand why those figures as church attendance and the number of church members would be considered to be confidential. This act of not disclosing statistical figures impedes the study of the Christian churches in Hong Kong. It is hoped that this denominationalist mindset will gradually diminish. As for the unintentional errors in statistical figures, we hope that every denomination and every church will do a better job in proofreading as some delicate errors can be detected only by those concerned people who have sufficient reference material to verify. Otherwise outsiders can have no way to make out where the trouble lies.

From the Chaplain

A Chaplain Is Who?

Who is the Chaplain? I am the present chaplain at the Seminary and there were a few other ministers who have served as our chaplain. The question "Who is the Chaplain?" is rather easy to answer. On the contrary, the question, "A chaplain is who?" is by no means an easy question to answer. On quite a few occasions in the past when people knew that I was HKBTS's chaplain, they became curious and were eager to know what my job was about.

Some would ask whether I would be slothful in the seminary since there would not be too many patients needing my cure. Usually I would give them a light smile and simply explain the difference between a hospital chaplain and a seminary chaplain. The work of a hospital chaplain involves paying visits to patients and their families and also caring for the emotional and spiritual needs of the medical personnel. On the other hand, a seminary chaplain is responsible for the spiritual formation of those on the seminary campus.

Then, some would go on to ask further questions: There are over ten seminaries in Hong Kong laying stress on spiritual formation, why is it that not every one of them has a chaplain? Moreover, is it not true that the seminary teachers teach by

word and by deed, so would they not also care for the students?

Therefore, the question, "A chaplain is who?" is one that I myself have never stopped pondering. A seminary chaplain is responsible for the spiritual formation on campus. However, obviously, many teachers work together to nurture the spiritual lives of students. I am the one responsible to coordinate and implement this ministry. For example, in HKBTS students are required to join their Spiritual Formation Group every month. This year we have nine groups led by nine teachers, and I am just one of them.

The spiritual formation work on campus also includes our staff workers. For example, every Monday after lunch, there is the staff prayer meeting. I attend almost all of their meetings. The staff workers take turns and only occasionally do I lead. Thank God that there is a small core of staff members who faithfully and persistently turn up to lead the prayer meetings.

The seminary chaplain is who? The chaplain is responsible for coordinating and implementing the spiritual formation on campus, especially in the visible curriculum. As for the hidden curriculum, such as individual care and instances when life brings changes to someone's life. This is an important ministry that I look forward to talking about in the future if there is opportunity.

"The chaplain is who?" is the question I myself keep asking and waiting as I seek to serve the Lord God.

Admissions and Registration Office

This summer we were very busy. Just when we were about to go on a vacation, the new school year began. Incidentally, the school year began on the very day when a major typhoon hit Hong Kong.

Let me tell you about our new crop of students. This year we have thirty one new students: 2 in the Master of Theology program; 21, the Master of Divinity program; 7, the Bachelor of Arts in the Pastoral Studies program and I non-classified student. The composition of these new students is worth noting. For example, of the students in the Master of Divinity program, 14 are full time students and 7, part-time. The majority full time students have years of working experience and have a family while the part time students look young and energetic although they worked full time on a church staff. The will and plan of our Heavenly Father who called his children to full time ministry is unique for each person. I pray that our Father will bless our new students, giving protection and peace and helping them adjust to the Seminary's study style. Pray that by relying on God they can overcome all their difficulties and soon immerse themselves in the joys of campus life.

In fact, the preparation work for the beginning of the school year was not easy due to the last minute switching of class

teachers and the re-arrangement of time table had to be done in great haste. Thank God for his provision. Although we were busy putting things in place and we had to shorten the spiritual formation camp held right before the school year due to a major typhoon's approaching, we still felt students' enthusiasm and their passion and love for the Seminary as the school term began. Seeing that everything went smoothly, I was deeply touched!

When the Chaplain, Rev. Lam, and I were considering of a theme for next year's student recruitment, we agreed that we were all together on God's road. This is the case for those brothers and sisters being called to full time ministry and so is HKBTS. Being God's sons and daughters, upon what should we rely as we step forward? Would it not be the simple, pure heart of faith? That is why the theme, "The Leap of Faith," was finally confirmed and next year's Seminary Annual Concert of Praise will also use this theme. We pray that God will continue to direct and bless us!

On November 15 (Saturday) this year, we will continue to hold the Student Recruitment Talk 2008-09. This half-day talk is designed for those brothers and sisters exploring full time ministry or considering full time seminary training. There will be numerous sessions including conversation with seminary professors, sharing and praying with seminary students in search for God's guidance, and of course, a short message, a time of hymns singing and praise and an introduction of HKBTS's programs.

Lay Theological Education Department

Choi Yim-to (Associate Director)

"Train a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not turn from it." (Proverbs 22:6) This is the instruction God gave the Israelites and it applies to us as parents, teachers and instructors in children's ministry, since teaching children is our sacred responsibility! To help our churches and families face the challenge of a new generation of child-rearing, we have organized a seminar and workshop on "A Little More Love in the Family—A Family-based New Blueprint for Cultivating Children" on April 19. That day more than 500 people turned up, and from this we can see that ministers and lay people are concerned much with the issue of child-rearing.

This October, we launched the Childhood Ministry Diploma / Certificate program to provide a holistic and systematic equipping for those interested in ministering to children in the church or in school. There was an enthusiastic response with over 80 people (mostly female) enrolling in the program. Students are from different backgrounds, mainly instructors in children's ministry in church, a number of kindergarten or primary school teachers, and of course, parents wanting to be better equipped for good parenting. The good response is pleasing and encouraging. We hope that God will use this program to provide his people with holistic training, to promote their continual growth, and to allow them to bless their families and community and especially bless

the children whom they minister and nurture. After all children are the future of the church and our society!

It is indisputable that the Hong Kong population is ageing. As early as 2001, we established the Elderly Ministry program to provide a holistic and systematic training for those interested in ministering to the elderly in our churches and in the broader society. In the past seven years, almost 200 students have graduated from the program. This year we have over 40 students enrolled in the program. In fact, quite a number of Christian organizations provide service for the elderly, serving them with love and dedication. This year in September, Gospel For The Aged Ltd joined with China Alliance Press in the launching of "Book Donation Project of Hope" and donated over 50 books and AV items to LTED as reference materials for students and lecturers in the Elderly Ministry program. We are most grateful for their donation. With their affirmation and support, we are all the more eager to train Christian leaders so that they continue to care for and minister to the elderly, proclaiming the gospel of Christ to them.

We hope that in the future we can have more such opportunities to cooperate with churches and Christian organizations, to support one another in theological education for the good of those who love God and let God's name be glorified!

Student Union

Ever since the "Self-service Snack Bar" was set

up half a year ago, it was popular among commuting students and those in the student quarter.
